## **An Origin**

We are citizens of the United States of America. We grew up under the auspices of an ideal — an ideal sung to us, taught to us in our classrooms, woven into the fabric of our public squares, marketed to us in every season of our lives. The ideal of freedom.

That ideal lit a burning desire in our hearts: the desire to see *real* freedom — not the kind packaged for export and forgotten at home, not the kind invoked at ceremonies and ignored on ordinary days, but the lived freedom of human beings able to direct their own lives, in their own homes, on their own land, with their own minds, surrounded by the people they love.

In the years since, we have observed that the States of the world — including those that speak the loudest of liberty — continue to take absurd liberties of their own: with the bodies, the labor, the speech, the movement, and the data of those who live under their administration. The defilement of basic human rights, executed in the very names of order and security, is no longer the exception. It is now sufficiently routine that it scarcely raises objection.

We were taught that freedom was the inheritance of a particular nation. We have come to believe it is the inheritance of every human being on Earth.

## **A New Frontier**

The age now opening — the age of pervasive data, of augmented reality, of artificial intelligence and autonomous machines — confronts every human being with a question that no prior generation has had to answer with such clarity:

*What is mine, and what belongs to the systems that surround me?*

When a person works in the world, walks through a city, speaks to a friend, queries a model, drives an instrument, or simply exists in the presence of connected devices, an exhaust of data is produced. That exhaust — every step, every search, every utterance, every transaction, every biological measurement — is now collected, retained, indexed, and acted upon, often without the person's knowledge, frequently without their meaningful consent, and almost never with any sense that the person retains sovereignty over what is, at base, a description of their own self.

We hold that there is a line. There is a line between **what is the responsibility of a human being** as they make use of the services and environments offered by States and by the world — the Internet, the marketplaces, the institutions, the tools — and **what are their absolute, undeniable rights to a level of sovereignty over themselves and their own decisions.**

The Freedom Nation Sovereignty Initiative exists to draw that line.

## **A Mission**

The Initiative undertakes three things, and only three things:

**To define.** To articulate, in plain language and in terms that survive translation across cultures and legal traditions, what those rights and responsibilities are. These are not novel claims. They are the same human rights humanity has long affirmed, extended in their full measure to the new instruments of human life.

**To frame.** To produce charters and frameworks — declarations of shared intent and ideological alignment — that articulate these principles in a form that States, institutions, and individuals can sign, study, and over time fold into their own legal architectures. The Initiative does not write the laws of any State. It writes the principles around which the laws of States can converge.

**To support.** To support, through endorsement and where appropriate financing, the development of the tools — software, infrastructure, education, and operational practice — by which these principles can be lived in the ordinary course of life. A right that cannot in practice be exercised is no right at all. The Initiative therefore supports the construction of the means by which rights can in fact be lived.

## A Methodology

The work of the Initiative proceeds in passes, as relevant areas become accessible. Each pass produces a Charter or instrument addressed to a specific frontier of human freedom.

The Initiative's first pass — and the foundation of the institution — is **sovereign data**. The first instrument of the Initiative is *The International Data Sovereignty Charter of 2026*, which articulates the principle that the data generated by, owned by, or describing a human being is as inseparable from that human being's identity as the composition of their blood and the sequencing of their DNA, and is owed the same level of legal protection.

Subsequent passes will, as their frontiers mature and as the conversation among States and institutions matures alongside them, address other dimensions of sovereignty: the rights of the human being in the presence of artificial intelligence, the rights of the human being in augmented and virtual environments, the rights of the human being in the operation of autonomous instruments, the rights of the human being in biometric and bodily-data contexts, and others as the technological and political conditions admit.

In each pass, the Initiative will:

1. **Convene the question** in language accessible to citizens, statesmen, and technologists alike, free of jargon and free of partisan edge.

2. **Produce an instrument** — a Charter or comparable document — open for signature by States, institutions, and individuals who share its ideological alignment, framed as an expression of intent rather than as a binding obligation.
3. **Seek collaboration with State actors** willing to begin, in good faith and at their own pace, the legislative work that gives effect to the instrument's principles. The Initiative does not coerce; it convenes.
4. **Maintain a public monitor** , consolidating the work being done by Signatories — by States, by companies, by institutions, by individuals — toward the realization of the principles, and publishing that consolidation as an annual report to the international community.
5. **Recognize, through that annual reporting, those who are doing the work** — and offer the international community a clear, neutral, and ongoing view of which actors are advancing the cause of freedom in fact and not only in word.

The monitoring function exists for one reason: in a world saturated with claims, citizens deserve to know who is doing the work and who is not. The Initiative will name those who are. It will not name those who are not. The absence of mention is the only adverse signal the monitoring function will ever convey.

## **An Invitation**

The Initiative is, in this its founding year, small. It does not pretend otherwise. Its strength lies in the willingness of those who recognize themselves in its principles to lend their names, their work, their patience, and where they choose, their resources to its growth.

We invite **States** who recognize that freedom is the inheritance of their citizens — and not a privilege granted by their administrations — to sign

the Initiative's Charters as expressions of alignment with these principles. Signature creates no binding obligation; it creates an invitation, to themselves and to the international community, to act in accordance with what they have signed, in good faith and at their own pace.

We invite **institutions and companies** who recognize that the people whose data, attention, and creative output they receive must remain sovereign over the same — to identify themselves as Founding Members of the Initiative, on the parallel track described in our Founding Member program.

We invite **citizens** who recognize, in the pages above, the same burning desire that lit our own hearts — to follow the work, to lend it credibility, to insist of their own States that these principles enter the law of their land, and to insist of their own institutions that these principles enter the design of the products they use.

## A Sponsor

The Initiative is sponsored, custodially and at its founding, by **Qosil, Ltd.** — a private company organized under the laws of the Republic of Kazakhstan and registered at the Astana International Financial Centre. Qosil makes available, as a reference implementation of the Initiative's first Charter, the system known as **bRRAI**n — a zero-trust, owner-controlled data vault and identity infrastructure, including the **bRRAI**n ID **Registry** at [id.brrain.io](https://id.brrain.io) for cryptographically-attributed personal and agent identifiers. Qosil's custodial role is performed in good faith and in service to the Initiative's principles, without commercial self-interest in the recognition function.

The choice of a private company as the founding custodian is deliberate. We hold that the work of articulating principles, convening instruments, and reporting on progress must be conducted independently of any State, lest the principles be quietly subordinated to the interests of any

administration. Custodianship may, in time and by majority of the Signatory body, transfer to another entity better suited to its scale.

## **A Closing**

We were taught that freedom was a national inheritance. We choose, with this Founding Statement, to make of it an international labor.

The work begins with the data that describes us. It will continue with the agents that act for us. It will extend to the environments that surround us, to the instruments we wield, and to the new frontiers that the coming decades will produce.

We invite the company of those who would walk this road with us.
